

The Santa Barbara Vintners is a nonprofit trade association founded in 1983 to promote and protect the Santa Barbara County wine industry.

Known for its stunning landscape and incredible diversity of wines, Santa Barbara Wine Country has joined the ranks of Sonoma and Napa as one of the top grape-growing and wine-producing regions in California.

The region has two significant mountain ranges that run East-to-West instead of the typical North-to-South. This unusual orientation creates a transverse valley, which opens to the Pacific, allowing the cool ocean air and dense fog to roll deep into the valley. At 44 miles long, this is the longest transverse valley from Alaska to Chile.

With the temperature increasing one degree for every mile away from the ocean, multiple microclimates are formed. Each night, the fog settles onto the vines creating misty mornings until the sun shines mid-day, evaporating the water droplets and clearing out the valley. The temperature can range from 60 degrees by the shore to 100 degrees at the end of the valley, while an individual vineyard commonly sees over 50 degree diurnal shifts.

As a result of this unusual geography, seven distinct American Viticultural Areas (AVA) have been defined in Santa Barbara County, growing as many varieties of winegrape as the entire country of France. The cool climes near the ocean foster Burgundian wines, while the Rhone varieties grow mid-valley, and finally, Bordeaux wines flourish in the inland heat. This incredible range of wines spawned the region's slogan: *West of France*, *just North of Los Angeles*.

With more than fifty years growing winegrapes, the region gained recognition when it won the coveted Wine Star award from Wine Enthusiast Magazine for Region of the Year in 2021. Winning over such worthy regions as Provence, France and Marlborough, New Zealand, the award brought international attention to the region.

With over \$160 million dollars in retails sales every year, the wine industry of Santa Barbara County has a \$1.7 billion dollar impact on the local economy, and directly supports more than 10,000 jobs. The industry has grown almost 50% (48.83%) in sales in the past five years, making it one of the fastest growing wine regions in California.

The wine industry is the most valuable locally sourced and processed agricultural product in Santa Barbara County.
